USE OF DASHES



The ground was boggy and as he ran beads of mud squished between his claws and spattered the pouch round his neck. In this extract from Chapter 2, dashes are used in two ways:

- 1. As a pair, around a bit of extra information (similar to how you would use a pair of commas)
- 2. Like a single comma to mark a pause in the sentence.


