Questions 1, 4 and 7 (Application)

Greater Depth Write the next paragraph to continue the story including a fronted adverbial. Paragraphs to include a broad range of fronted adverbials, more complex and descriptive vocabulary including adverbs, and a broader range of adjectives and conjunctions.

Developing Explain if the text will still make sense if two paragraphs swap positions. Paragraphs to fit criteria given for Question 1.

Expected Explain if the text will still make sense if two paragraphs swap positions. Paragraphs to fit criteria given for Question 4.

Greater Depth Explain if the text will still make sense if two paragraphs swap positions. Paragraphs to fit criteria given for Question 7.

Questions 3, 6 and 9 (Reasoning)

Developing Explain if a fronted adverbial could be added to a given sentence at the start of a paragraph. Paragraphs to fit criteria given for Question 1.

Expected Explain if a fronted adverbial could be added to a given sentence at the start of a paragraph. Paragraphs to fit criteria given for Question 4.

Greater Depth Explain if a fronted adverbial could be added to a given sentence at the start of a paragraph. Paragraphs to fit criteria given for Question 1.

before he looked down at the flowers.
6a. Marvin is not correct because Pog did
not look at the trees first.

Greater Depth

7a. Various answers, for example: In the blink of an eye, two mysterious creatures stepped into the open. With his mouth open, Pog stared at them in amazement. As soon as they saw him, they stopped talking. Nobody dared to move a muscle. 8a. The text does not still make sense because he looked at the trees before he heard people talking and froze to the spot.

9a. Jacob is correct because Pog could look up at the trees just after the birds flew away.

Application and Reasoning Sequencing Paragraphs

Developing

1b. Various answers, for example: Then, the figure started running towards her. She picked her snowboard up off the ground. She turned around and ran as fast as she could.

2b. The text does not still make sense because Layla goes down the hill before she turns around to go back up.

3b. Lila is not correct because paragraph 5 does not give the first events in the story.

Expected

4b. Various answers, for example: Suddenly the dark figure started running in her direction. Layla grabbed her board off the ground and held it tightly. She spun around and sprinted as fast as she could. 5b. The text does not still make sense because Layla got up early before she stood at the top of the slope ready for snowboarding.

6b. Suzie is correct because Layla may have had her eyes closed for a while before eventually turning around.

Greater Depth

7b. Various answers, for example: Immediately, Layla started to panic. She had been coming here for years and had never seen anyone else out at this time. Keeping her eyes on the dark figure, she picked up her snowboard and got ready to run.

8b. The text does not still make sense because Layla snowboarded down the slope after walking to the slope.

9b. Mia is not correct because the snow crunching beneath her boots isn't the third event in the story.
